Key Stage 1 Assessment for Parents

REPORTING TO PARENTS



At the end of the year, teachers are required to summarise children's academic achievements to parents. In year 2 we are required to use standardised tests as an aid to our teacher assessments.

Teacher assessment is <u>still</u> the most reliable assessment of what your child can achieve.

PHONICS TESTING

- Children took the Year 1 Phonics Screening test last year
- Children who scored below 32 will be tested again
- The outcomes of the test will be given to parents as a snapshot of their phonics ability

TEACHER ASSESSMENTS

The teacher assessments, in the subjects below, are reported to you, the county and the Government at the end of year 2.

> English reading English writing Mathematics Science

Teacher assessment takes account of achievement in all areas of the curriculum and includes information gained through discussion and observation in a wide range of contexts.

OUTCOMES OF TEACHER ASSESSMENTS

For English and mathematics teacher assessments will be reported as:

Pre-keystage foundation (PKS) Has not met the expected standard (HNM) Working towards the expected standard (WTS) Expected standard (EXS)

Greater depth in the expected standard (GDS)

For science:

Has not met the expected standard (HNM) Has met the expected standard (EXS)





KEY STAGE ONE TESTS

- In May the children will take tests to help inform teacher assessments.
- These are:
- Two reading Comprehension tests for all
- Spelling test for levels for all
- Mathematics arithmetic test for all
- Mathematics reasoning test for all

KEY STAGE ONE TESTS – Reading

The Reading Test consists of two separate papers:

- Paper 1 Contains a selection of texts with questions about the text.
- Paper 2 Contains a reading booklet of a selection of passages. Children will write their answers to questions about the passage in a separate booklet.
- Each paper is worth 50% of the marks and should take approximately 30 minutes to complete, although the children are not being assessed at working at speed so will not be strictly timed.
- The texts will cover a range of poetry, fiction and non-fiction.
- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation




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KEY STAGE ONE TESTS - maths

- Paper 2 reasoning




Paper 1 – arithmetic Paper 2 – reasoning



KEY STAGE ONE TESTS – writing

- The children will not do a writing test.
- Teachers will use pieces of writing from across the year to access whether or not the children have met the expected standard.



HOW WE HELP THE CHILDREN

- Providing opportunities to see and do example tests.
- Ensuring that, as far as possible for each child, we have covered all the compulsory elements in each subject before they try the assessments.



HOW WE HELP THE CHILDREN

- Ensure that the classroom is as quiet and stressfree as possible during this time.
- Timetable tests for when children are most alert.
- Make sure the children have worthwhile breaks between different parts of the tasks.
- Provide low key, fun activities for children to complete at times when they are not having assessment tasks.
- Not put unnecessary pressure on the tests e.g. the children know them as quizzes!



HOW YOU CAN SUPPORT YOUR CHILD

- Try not to refer to the assessments in the weeks running up to them.
- Continue to ensure children get plenty of sleep.
- Lots of praise and encouragement.

Reading:
 Reading, reading and more reading!

 *Allow your child to work out words and to self-correct as he or she is reading.
 *Discuss what has been read and ask them

comprehension questions.

*Read to your child and discuss what you have read continued ...

Maths:

*Provide opportunities for your child to handle and count money, tell the time, estimate, weigh and measure. *Play maths games which require skills of addition, subtraction and problem solving.

*Practise mental maths skills, particularly number facts within 20. e.g. 12+3=?+5=16 18-6= 12-?=10*Practise the 2, 5 and 10 times table and related division facts. e.g. $3 \times 5 =$? X 5 = 20 $30 \div 5 =$

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NEXT STEPS

- The assessments will be marked by school staff and will be converted to a scaled score to assess if the child has met the expected national standard.
- Teachers can use these scores to help their teacher assessment.
- The final teacher assessment will be reported to parents in the end of year school report.
